The Awakened Traveler and the Church Journey

By the time most of you read this newsletter, we will be wrapping up our “Awakened Traveler” sermon series, and like most sermon series there were some sermons that really connected to people and other sermons already filed away in our supposed memory banks. Likewise, when we reflect on the life of the church as a journey, it aids us in framing the history of the church with calm neutrality. We step back and realize that the church will not be judged at “the end” with one final human measurement or grade. While at one time we were this thriving group that set much of the pace for Sandpoint, Idaho, we are content not being that in the community, so long as we are what God wants us to be now in this moment. Before we move out of this journey sermon series, I recommend that we reclaim peace in our hearts with being on this continuing long journey so long as God blesses us to be so.

If the Holy Spirit is truly with us, we should not have to utterly exhaust ourselves to share the good news with our neighbors nor empower the next round of leaders God sends our way. I came across this little aha moment in my required reading for the Zephyr Point Transitional Certification, “The problem with striving is that we erroneously place ourselves at the center of the equation. We form false attachments to actions of our own making. We imagine that it is all up to us and that the best of our efforts, skills, and imaginings will be enough to overcome the obstacles. We are like the Kansas peddler in Oz, hidden behind the control panel and trying to pass ourselves off as the great and powerful Wizard. (How to Lead When You Don’t Know Where You’re Going by Susan Beaumont, page 43)” Within this journey we preserve space for this liminal time to be what we are now in the unknowing. We are children of God waiting for Spirit to show us the way. In our waiting we pray, we reflect, we catalog history but don’t drag it into the future like a dusty idol, and we look up expecting the unexpected.

We expect good things from our loving God and this season is good too. After all, what if this journey of not being the leader with all the answers is the prerequisite to be the church our community needs in the future?

SESSION NOTES

June 18, 2025

First Presbyterian Church Sandpoint began a new chapter of its 122-year history with Rev. Catherine Lyle moderating the June Session meeting. Because of a busy agenda, we didn't ceremonially acknowledge this milestone but, instead, got busy doing the good work of the church.

Judy Labrie highlighted the good work of the Website Development Committee by demonstrating the new FPC website that will become "live" about the same time this issue of The Grapevine reaches your email. Our international team - Lynne Stockman and David Harper operating remotely from Bar Hill, England (just outside of Cambridge) – effectively coordinated with our Sandpoint-based committee. You will be amazed as well when you visit the new website at www.fpcsandpoint.org later in July. In the meantime, you can find our current website at the same address.

As you are aware, we are welcoming more community organizations to use our facilities. Our sanctuary, with its excellent acoustics, has long provided an ideal venue for musical concerts and recitals. The Bonner County Human Rights Task Force, with our pastor and several Presbyterians as charter members at the time, use our facilities on a regular basis. Several groups, including the popular Wednesday Soup Kitchen, are in the building almost daily following the closure of the Gardenia Center. And the list goes on.

These non-church activities generate revenue to support our frugal budget and we realize other benefits as well. For instance, a member of one of the groups occasionally volunteers his handyman skills to assist with some of our maintenance projects. Mary Sturgis, building and grounds elder, enjoys hearing, "... you buy the materials and I'll do the work."

Session carefully screens all requests for use of our facilities to ensure that they are compatible with our Christian mission. Occasionally we deny a request but, more often, we find ourselves juggling conflicting schedules and meeting locations. For example, can Group A that normally meets in Fellowship Hall move to the basement for one meeting to allow Group B into Fellowship Hall?

This long-winded explanation summarizes our session discussion for accommodating the Bike the US for MS group of 36 cyclists who will be staying two nights in our church this August. Their stay will disrupt several of our on-going activities. Our good friends at the Methodist Church have volunteered to help and it will all work out.

More and more often we notice our century-old "sacred space" becoming "community space" as well. This transition may be as simple as the mother who brings her two young daughters to our Little Free Library or the hospital workers enjoying lunch in the Peace Garden. While not encouraged, we occasionally host a homeless transient for an overnight stay while encouraging the person to seek a better solution to their problems.

SESSION NOTES

June 18, 2025

Once again, this brings up the Ezra 3 Project. This Presbytery-sponsored program encourages churches to explore opportunities to connect with their local community. While it requires a substantial commitment to participate in the Ezra 3 Project, we will receive a grant to implement a community project. We have until August 2 to decide whether or not to participate. This allows Session time to assemble a team for this worthwhile endeavor.

The bullet following bullet points will briefly summarize other items from our June 18 Session meeting:

- Approved appreciation gifts, including cash (US dollars rather than British pounds) and a local restaurant gift card, to Lynne Stockman and David Harper for their pro bono website development.
- Approved a proposal from Retreat Team members Judy Labrie and Sharon Anderson to host a Dream Workshop led by Colleen Russell on October 11 and 18, 2025.
- Investigate our current computer situation to ensure the compatibility and efficiency of our IT system.
- Mary Sturgis listed several facilities maintenance projects that are scheduled for the summer. These include painting the soffits on the Fellowship Hall building and the concrete half-wall on the exterior of the sanctuary. Mary announced that Avista may upgrade our old lighting with LED fixtures at no cost.
- Session allocated up to \$200 to the Earth Care Team for maintenance and planting of the raised garden beds.

In conclusion, Session normally takes a summer recess in July and August. However, we remain available to approve routine items through an email consent or to schedule a special meeting if needed.

In other financial news, two Certificates of Deposit at Washington Trust Bank were renewed on May 30th. Interest of \$4,129 was moved into the church savings account and a third CD was opened.

Through the first six months of the year, revenue and expenses are slightly ahead of the modified budget.

Our Plan for Ministry:

To provide meaningful, life changing **WORSHIP** every week of the year. **\$90,000** (75% of general budget)

Highlights January to July

- Weekly worship services were held with an average of 30 to 35 worshippers gathering together to praise God and hear God's word
- Live Streaming of weekly services allowed for anytime viewing; a few individuals made regular use of this format via YouTube
- Special worship services were held Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday
- Earth Care Committee members coordinated the Sunday worship service on April 27th with readings, reflections and a demonstration of preparation of an A-Z beehive frame
- Over 20 church members assisted Sunday worship serving as worship assistant, usher, or Live Streaming technician
- During Pastor Andy Kennaly's study leave and vacation weeks, Sunday worship services were led with a blend of visiting ordained clergy and lay leaders from the church
- Worship services were enhanced with special music from the choir with the leadership and musical voice of Dana Stockman and the talents of Annie Welle at the piano

To **NURTURE** people on their faith journeys. **\$18,000** (15% of general budget)

Highlights January to July

- **Adult Nurture**, facilitated by Sharon Anderson, Judy Labrie, and Pastor Andy completed a study of John Newell's, The Great Search, grounded in Matthew 7: "Ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you." -NIV. This collection of different writers over hundreds of years and different cultures focused on ways nature informs our spiritual journey and helps us relate to each other, to nature, and to God.
- **Retreats:**
 - ◇ Three community retreat sessions facilitated by Ginna Minervini were provided to explore "Living with Dying – What death teaches us about living"
 - ◇ A "Lenten Journey on a Labyrinth" retreat and walk was facilitated by Pastor Andy
 - ◇ World Labyrinth Day, also facilitated by Pastor Andy, was celebrated with another opportunity linking us with the global community for an experience of contemplative faith and active, embodied prayer
- **Fellowship** With coordination by Sylvia Humes, Dyno Wahl and the help of many volunteers, weekly fellowship was provided following worship with additional soup suppers on Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday

- Special celebrations were held to honor:
 - ◊ The life and love of Dee Dreisbach,
 - ◊ Lynn and Dave Pietz prior to their move to Colorado,
 - ◊ Pastor Andy's retirement as a Minister of Word and Sacrament and 14 years of service at FPC and
 - ◊ Pastor Catherine Lyle's welcome as our Interim Pastor, spiritual leader and guide during this time of transition

To **WITNESS** to our faith in ministry and **MISSION** beyond ourselves. **\$12,000** (10% of general budget)

Highlights January to July

- Provided financial support through mission giving to several local nonprofit organizations:
 - ◊ Homelessness: Bonner Homeless Transitions
 - ◊ Illness: Community Cancer Services
 - ◊ Mental Health: NAMI Far North Idaho
 - ◊ Domestic violence/child abuse: Priest River Ministries Advocates for Women
- Provided financial support through the One Great Hour of Sharing special offering (\$784 given)
- Together with the Methodist Church family celebrated the holiday food collection with 3,721 pounds of food collected for the Bonner County Food Bank (last year's record 3,000 pounds)
- Co-Sponsored the annual Fundraiser Dinner with Sandpoint Senior Center (SASi) netting \$1777 which was divided between SASi and FPC's Mission fund
- FPC meets the per capita request of \$39 per member to support our connectional church with the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) General Assembly, Synod, and Presbytery in addition to missional gifts to General Assembly and Presbytery
- Pastor Andy's weekly sermons were posted on the church website and on Andy's Sub stack profile; the Live Stream video is on YouTube
- Pastor Catherine initiated a summer worship focus using tools from Marcia McPhee's Quest series of "The Awakened Traveler" emphasizing widening perspectives and expressing love of our neighbors
- Providing Fellowship Hall space and use of the kitchen in partnership with the Wednesday Soup Kitchen regularly provides a hot meal for 25-30 individuals
- Meeting space is offered for community use and local chapters of AA, Al Anon, and TOPS
- FPC partners with the Bonner County Human Rights Task Force by providing and supporting space for retreats, training and community gatherings
- The sanctuary is frequently used by many of the local music schools and groups for recitals and community concerts
- The gift of space in the Peace Garden, including a "Little Free Library" gets frequent visitors
- Congregation members volunteer in many ways at Sandpoint Senior Center serving as meal delivery drivers, food service helpers, and helping with special/fundraising events

Members and friends of FPC will help with that meal.

FAMILY FAVORITES

Kirsten Thompson shares this month's recipe:

Sour Cream Rhubarb Cake – Based on Oma's Rhubarb Cake from Allrecipes

My sister-in-law Beth Iverson from South Dakota told me about this recipe a couple of years ago, but she didn't have the recipe. I looked it up on the internet and found it on Allrecipes. As with most recipes for baked goods, I find that I've made several changes to the ingredients and technique, so I've renamed it and am resharing it. Between the rhubarb from our garden and a generous neighbor whose garden outpaces her love of rhubarb, I've made this several times this season. Enjoy!

Preheat oven to 350. Grease a 9 x 13 pan.

Wash and dry off about 8-9 rhubarb stems, and cut into $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$ inch pieces sufficient to make 4 cups or more of rhubarb. (The recipe works with up to 6 cups if you really, really love rhubarb.)

Mix together dry ingredients: 1.5 cups white flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup whole wheat pastry flour, 1 $\frac{1}{4}$ evaporated cane sugar, 1 tsp. baking soda, and $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt. Fold in prepared rhubarb.

Beat two eggs, and add 1 cup sour cream. Combine with dried ingredients and rhubarb. Mix well.

Spoon rhubarb mixture into baking dish.

Prepare streusel – $\frac{1}{4}$ cup softened butter, 1 cup evaporated cane sugar, $\frac{1}{4}$ cup flour, and $\frac{1}{2}$ - $\frac{3}{4}$ tsp. cinnamon. Combine until crumbly, and sprinkle over cake.

Bake at 350 for 45 – 55 minutes or until a toothpick inserted in the cake comes out clean. (My oven runs a bit slow, so my bake time tends longer.)

Serve with your favorite topping. Mascarpone whipped cream or ice cream work perfectly.



IN MEMORY

Margaret Ann (Michael) Maricle
June 26, 1943 – May 12, 2025

Margaret Ann Maricle passed away peacefully, leaving behind a legacy of kindness, resilience, and deep faith.

She was born in Bluefield, West Virginia, the only child of Randolph Earl and Margaret Elizabeth Michael. She grew up in Knoxville, Tennessee, graduated from West High School, and earned her degree in education from the University of Tennessee (Go Vols!).

After college, Margaret Ann moved to Virginia Beach with her best friend to teach—and, as they joked, to meet Navy officers. Both goals were met. She married Ensign Robert Maricle on June 18, 1966, and they flew to California the very next day to start their life together.

Margaret Ann taught English in Southern California before settling in San Luis Obispo County in 1976. There, she taught second grade, earned a master's degree in reading from Cal Poly, and went on to teach in Cuesta College's Special Education department until retirement.

In 2014, she and Bob moved to Sandpoint, Idaho, where they built a home and made lasting friendships. They later relocated to Buckeye, Arizona, to enjoy the sun and a new community.

Margaret Ann was deeply involved in her churches—Trinity United Methodist in Los Osos, First Presbyterian Church of San Luis Obispo, and First Presbyterian Church of Sandpoint—serving as an Elder, Deacon, and Stephen Minister. She also played piano for worship services and elementary school choirs, sharing her quiet talent with joy. A dedicated member of P.E.O., she remained active in chapters throughout California, Idaho, and Arizona, even helping found the chapter in Sun City Festival. She enjoyed reading and writing and wrote and published a book on the founding Cayucos, California, and the history behind the Cass House, built by the man who founded the town.

She embraced adventure, travel, and life's occasional misfortunes—including an armed robbery abroad—with humor, grace, and a preference for good chocolate over drama. She found joy in books, deep conversations, and the company of friends and family.

Preceded in death by her parents, Margaret Ann is survived by her husband, Bob; son Michael (Ines) of Santa Fe, New Mexico; and son Jeff (Kerrie) of Sandpoint, Idaho. She also welcomed Kerrie's sons, Zane and Brice, into her heart and family. She will be deeply missed and fondly remembered by all who knew her.

A memorial for Margaret Ann was held June 21st, at 10:30 AM at Desert Palms Presbyterian Church, Sun City West, AZ. The church will live stream, www.desertpalmschurch.org.




